







A MESSAGE FROM CAROLYN CRANSWICK - OUR AREA CHAIRMAN

I was very honoured to take over as Area Chairman from Audrey Balderstone in November. She was an excellent Chairman guiding the Area through the pandemic with her frequent newsletters and words of encouragement. She is a great role model for me but will be a hard act to follow.

I began flower arranging in 1965 by attending some classes with my future mother-in-law. In 1974 I met Barbara Hudson who was a NAFAS demonstrator and she invited me to help her start Clophill and District Flower Club. In 1976 we began with local members but over the years we have drawn in members from a wide area. When Barbara moved to Hampshire I took over as Chairman. During the following years there has been one other Chairman but I have continued for many years. The Club has continued to flourish with over 75 members and an excellent Committee – some of whom were also founder members. We depicted Handel's Messiah on a very large plinth.

I was The Flower Arranger Representative for about 10 years and enjoyed being involved with the Area Clubs and being part of the Executive Committee. In 2012 I was asked to be the Area Show Chairman and organised 5 successful Area Shows in the Riding School Centre at Hatfield House. Again, it was an opportunity to meet members from other Clubs and make some lasting friendships with members of the Committees.

I have represented the Area at Harrogate Flower Show on two occasions, Hylands House and Westminster Abbey. I enjoy a challenge and organising flower festivals also gives me great pleasure.

My husband John, is very supportive and takes an interest in my activities. I have a daughter Claire and son Jason and five grown up grandchildren. They are all following successful careers and interests.

As your Area Chairman I want to support and encourage all clubs in the Area. I am holding a Club Chairman's Forum in March to share ideas and information with them to help to involve and make all members fully aware of the opportunities they have as affiliated members of NAFAS. Our Area events are always good and we hold regular refresher days in the disciplines of demonstrating, teaching, judging and speaking as well as competing in Shows. I hope to move the Area forward in the future to greater success and hope to meet as many members as I can along the way.

Edna Holt



Edna was born in Slip End Luton on 28th January 1932 and died on 11th February 2023.

All at South Stevenage Flower Club were very sad to hear of Edna's passing. The club, all her family and friends have lost a very special person, who will be greatly missed by everyone who knew her.

Edna had a real passion for flowers, fun and enjoyed having people around her. We all remember her gift for making everyone very welcome. Her knowledge of flowers and plants, her energy and ideas lifted the love of flowers for many to a new level. One member recalls

that she had a way of entering the club into festivals without telling us. We, all very willing, stepped up - nobody wanted to let her down.

Edna started flower arranging after she was shocked by the bill at her daughter's wedding in 1987. Two years later she did all the flowers for her son's wedding.

Edna went to Oaklands College taking the City & Guilds Flower Arranging course, then started South Stevenage Flower Club in 1989. She did every job possible in the Club, she was Programme Secretary/Treasurer/Secretary and was Chairman for over 30 years, 1991-2023.

In 2004 she won a Silver Gilt medal at Chelsea with Miriam Hill and in 2006 she organised a large flower show at Barclay School, Stevenage to celebrate 60 years of Stevenage New Town.

She was asked to be the group leader for the NAFAS 50th anniversary, representing the Home Counties at Westminster Abbey in 2009 with a design based on Handel's Messiah.

Edna took part in many local flower festivals including Woburn, Bennington, St Mary's, Shephall, Walkern and in 2016 she organised a flower festival at St. Georges Church. Stevenage. Edna's energy took the club on numerous coach outings and holidays to Blackpool (twice), Holland, Dublin and Jersey.

Edna leaves a huge hole impossible to fill, a kind person with a big heart who was active in the club to the end even writing her Chairman's report for the 2022 AGM on 17th January 2023.

MY LAST DEMONSTRATION – VIKKI TRAHERNE

I have been demonstrating for 26 years. I heard on a television programme around Autumn time, that a couple had been together for 25 years. They said- a quarter of a century – so this made me think – wow I've demonstrated for over a quarter of a century!! I had been thinking for some time that age was creeping up on me and thoughts of retiring were uppermost in my mind. I was booked to do a Christmas demonstration on the 15th November last year at a club I had previously enjoyed visiting in Radlett, and I decided that this was going to be my last demonstration.

Thinking back, the person who put me on the road was Suzanne Boet who used to run flower competitions in Stockwood Park, Luton. I had entered and was chatting to her as I arranged, she suggested that as I could talk and arrange at the same time, I could be a demonstrator. And this is how it started. At around this time, I was doing a City & Guilds Flower Arranging course at Dunstable College, under the tutorship of Lesley Sturdy. My dedicated night of the week was Wednesday and for four years I learnt and loved a lot, which gave me the confidence, also the inspiration for my demonstrations. I have very much enjoyed my life in this wonderful hobby of 'fun, flowers and friendship' and would encourage others along this road.



Here are some of my 'fun' experiences – I've arranged at Kensington Palace for a festival and the design I was involved in was featured on the front cover of the newly designed Flower Arranger magazine, which used to be little booklets we could carry in our handbags. My Christmas designs have also been featured in the magazine, and I have written an article on candles from ancient times to the present day.

I have arranged twice in Westminster Abbey both quite different events. One for the service of The Order of the Bath, this for the Knights of the Realm, and the Queen and the then Prince Charles were to be in attendance. Events in which Royalty are

present follow exact timing. I was seated in the back row of the Knave – the service was due to start promptly at 11.00 am. Minutes passed and, after a lot of whispering, the trumpets sounded and the procession began. As you all probably know the Queen was tiny and despite standing tip-toe all I could see above the heads in front of me was the Crown moving slowly along. I couldn't see the Queen. After the service I was able to turn around and watch the Knights walk past in all their regalia, which included Prince Charles. I was surprised at how short he is with his ruddy complexion but did get a nice smile. It was revealed in the media the next day that he was due to fly into Westminster, but because of fog his helicopter couldn't take off and he had to travel by road creeping into the Abbey via a backdoor, I bet he got a telling off from his Mum!!!

My next Abbey experience was when a TV production company was making a film about a Year in the Life of the Abbey. I was in a position by the Quire stalls and was

manipulating Phormium leaves for my design when I became aware I was being filmed. I answered lots of questions and was quite chuffed at how the crew were interested. My friend Rayna Shiach was opposite to me and I saw she was being watched as she arranged. At the end of the day, I was requested to sign a document which roughly stated that if I was not featured in the programme, I had to accept this. In the event when it was shown there were about 15 seconds of me pointing towards Rayna saying, "You've got texture there". So that was my brief claim to fame. But yes, I did get several calls that I had been seen on the programme!

I have been involved in arranging at the Chelsea Flower Show and the first time gained a Silver medal for my Flower Club. The title of the exhibit was "Garden of Distinction". I worked with another club member, Tina Belderbos. We built a 'tree' out of bits of driftwood and, on each branch, we depicted an area of the RHS gardens at Wisley from annuals to orchids.

The second Silver medal I received was when I was in the team representing the Home Counties Area of NAFAS. The title of the huge design was "Earth's Diversity". This was an amazing fun time. Lots of laughs with fellow arrangers and extremely, exhausting hard work on the 20 feet across, 15 feet high stand in the Grand Marquee. I will never forget holding my breath as we watched our own Audrey Balderstone on a 'cherry picker'



adjusting an item on the top of the design. Remember the height of the display!! On Press Day, as I was by our stand, I was fascinated watching a beautiful lady dart around the arrangements taking notes. I was aware of someone next to me and turning around I found myself gazing up at Pierce Brosnan. The beautiful lady turned out to be his wife and she was wanting information for her garden in Ireland. At this stage I thought I had better try to get his autograph and get for him the information leaflet with all the plant details. At that time there was the editor of the Flower Arranger magazine standing a few yards away and as I collected the leaflet from her, she said 'send him a kiss from me'. I returned and was delighted he was still there. I said to him see that lady over there – well she wants to send you a kiss. Well guess who got the kiss – right on my cheek. Obviously, I didn't wash my face for a week. I've also gained a Bronze and Silver Guilt medal at this wonderful event. The hard graft, working through the night, is rewarded in the early morning hours by the dawn chorus and being able to wander around the grounds admiring all the gardens without the crowds on open days. Definitely a bonus.

I have enjoyed working with the Rose Society which was based in St Albans, on their stand at the Hampton Court Flower Show. The team was picked up to travel to the show by coach very early, so we missed the traffic and no car parking. We usually finished about lunch time which meant a whole afternoon to wander around the show and to actually buy plants, which you can't at Chelsea. My Hostas were purchased this way. The only downside here was that the roses were picked direct from the fields by the growers, then placed in buckets for the arrangers to use and then we had the joy of removing rose thorns from our fingers on the way home!!



I once entered the Hatfield Flower Show and to my surprise and delight won Best in Show. The title was 'Gardeners Delight'. I based my design on tomatoes with the same name, together with vegetables and a few flowers. It was amusing to hear some of the viewing public's views such as 'how can that have won Best in Show when there are no flowers'. I've often felt the same. The fun here was being presented with my prize by the Marchioness of Salisbury (she who helped and advised the then Prince Charles on his garden at Highgrove). She was a delightful lady and on giving me a beautiful glass rose bowl suggested I should fill it with roses to enjoy. This was the first time the bowl had been used and knowing how hard our water is, I felt this was not a good idea as the water could etch into the glass. I was so worried about it getting damaged that it remained

wrapped up securely in a cupboard until returning it for the next prize winner.

One of my proudest events in which I was chosen to represent Home Counties Area, was the WAFA Elimination Competition in Weston-Super-Mare in October 2004. This was to choose the designer to travel to Japan on behalf of the United Kingdom. The title of the competition was "Masterpiece", and I gained a Commended award. I was very content with the result, as I was up against top international designers. Two on either side of me were unlucky. The winner was National Demonstrator Ian Buxton.

I've travelled all distances around the UK flower clubs, and another highlight was being asked to demonstrate in Spain. This time I was able to take my husband, David, and after an enjoyable day choosing flowers and club members' containers the event went off successfully. We had hired a car, and as my husband speaks Spanish, we took to the road not knowing exactly where we were going to travel to, and staying in delightful hotels ending up in Granada. This meant we were able to visit the amazing Alhambra Palace. We finished up in Malaga and visited the museum devoted to Picasso's art. His early portraits of his children are a delight, but I cannot say that I enjoyed his later cubic art – quite weird.

As you can see, I have had a great time being part of NAFAS and the opportunities I have had with wonderful memories, and meeting special people. I was a bit sad at the end of my 'Last Demonstration' but will continue to keep arranging by being a member of five clubs and learning more through attending workshops. There is always something new and exciting in our floral art.

Flowers for the Commonwealth Day Service



I was so excited to be invited to arrange flowers in Westminster Abbey for the Commonwealth Day Service on 13th March, having missed an opportunity last year due to the service being cancelled. I asked Ann Swain who is Vice Chairman of Clophill and District Club to come and work alongside me to create two matching designs at the High Altar. Ann and I have arranged together many times and it required co-operation to make the pedestals reflect one another.

We went on Saturday 11th March with our scissors and foliage. Fortunately, Ann's husband David took us and also carried the buckets and bags and swept up after us! The Abbey was closed to the public as the preparations were taking place for the service. The chandeliers were being polished, the BBC were setting up their equipment and various groups were rehearsing and 6 NAFAS ladies were arranging the flowers. The excitement was growing!

We had a large amount of flowers and foliage in white, gold and purple to create a traditional pedestal 9-10' high with no step ladders, just lots of reaching and stepping back to inspect and compare. It was a challenge to keep the shape and place all the stems into the foam. We were very pleased with the results.

We received invitations to attend the service and were told we would be sitting in the South transept behind HM The King and members of the Royal family. We were just round the corner but I was able to look across and see them arrive and then the back of the ladies hats! We were pleased to have a large screen in front of us so that we could watch all the service at close hand. It was a multi cultural, multi faith service with an accent on youth and the theme was 'Forging a Sustainable and Peaceful Common Future'

There was a very friendly atmosphere within the Abbey and a sense of occasion and excitement. 2,000 people from all parts of the Commonwealth, schools and organisations, government and dignitaries. We both felt very proud when we saw our designs featured on the television screens, particularly when all the religious leaders stood in front of them. It was a privilege and honour to be part of such a special day.

We had travelled to Westminster Abbey by train and taxi, stopping for a lovely lunch before going to join the queue to get through the high security. The bells were peeling as we left and went to find a taxi back to the station. We had much to reflect on as we headed home and all our family and friends had watched the service on the television but we were lucky as WE WERE THERE!!

It is always members of NAFAS who arrange the flowers in Westminster Abbey at all the services. The flowers are provided and we have the privilege to go and arrange, generally large traditional arrangements. This is one of the benefits of being a member of NAFAS. The Area has a list of members with experience and skills and are willing to be part of a team. Please contact me if you would like to be added to the list.

UPDATE ON NEW NAFAS COURSES IN FLORAL ART & DESIGN

Following the funding and accreditation being withdrawn for Flower Arranging classes, NAFAS has been working hard to produce a course promoting the knowledge of flower arranging. This is nearing fruition and at the Florilegium show in May at Gloucestershire it will be highly promoted.

The course consists of modules suitable for all levels of knowledge. From the learner with no previous experience to the person wanting to expand and increase their knowledge. There are 28 modules available and the hope is that they will be accredited by Ofqual in the very near future. If offered by clubs, it could encourage the existing members and could lead to new membership.

It is hoped that the course will be taught by some of our experienced and registered tutors. Already Fiona Harrison from Harpenden has expressed an interest in doing so and will publicise details as they become available at a future date.
